She is a collaborator and performer of children's programs at libraries and a recital series educating audiences on classical soprano traditions and styles. Sarah is a member of the original cast of Jane Austen's Persuasion: A Musical Drama and has performed the role of Henrietta in numerous international productions with Chamber Opera Chicago. Other credits include: Liesl in The Sound of Music and Kitty in Jane Austen's Pride and Prejudice (Chamber Opera Chicago), Rapunzel in Into the Woods (Southland Area Theatre Ensemble), and Phyllis in Iolanthe (Prairie Fire Theater). Most recently, Sarah was featured as an artist on the Youtube world premiere of Elizabeth Rudolph's "Circles, Cycles & Seasons". Sarah earned a Vocal Performance degree from Illinois Wesleyan University and is the recipient of a Bella Voce Award from Chicago's Bel Canto Foundation. She works during the school year as a project specialist for the Music & Theatre Department and Performing Arts Division of New Trier High School.

Equally at home on the operatic stage or in concert repertoire, soprano Susan Nelson has been praised by critics for her "full, powerful voice - agile and pliant" as well as her interpretations, called both "sensitive and moving" and "full of life and vigor", showcasing her versatility in repertoire from Bach and Mozart to verismo and contemporary opera, as well as light opera and popular music. A member of the Grant Park Chorus since 2003 and soloist in their 2021 Vivaldi Gloria, she also stepped in to sing the soprano solos in Benjamin Britten's Spring Symphony on 36 hours notice. Susan's Chicago area solo appearances include Fort Wayne Philharmonic Orchestra, South Bend Symphony, Elmhurst Choral Union, and Midwest Mozart Festival. The 2022-23 season includes Six Characters in Search of Gilbert and Sullivan, Rosalia in West Side Story with the Northwest Indiana Symphony, Handel's Messiah with the Rockford Choral Union, Mozart's Requiem with the Chicago Bar Association Orchestra and Chorus, and a Bach cantata at Grace Lutheran in River Forest. During the pandemic she recorded five hundred songs by women composers/songwriters of all different genres and has presented lecture recitals on the topic at universities, clubs and retirement homes.

Christine Steyer is the 2020 Honored Artist of The American Prize for outstanding contributions to the arts. The soprano has received acclaim for her portrayals of Madame Butterfly and Violetta, and has sung in 40 productions at Lyric Opera of Chicago. She recently shared the stage with Lawrence Brownlee, members of the Chicago Symphony and Lyric Opera of Chicago Orchestras and was featured on WFMT's program *Music Notes: Music of Healing and Peace*. Steyer is an avid recitalist and producer, showcasing unique works by women writers and composers. In 2021, she premiered the role of the Rio de Janeiro Health Care Worker in *On Call: COVID-19* and in 2022 premiered the role of Flanna in *Future Perfect*. Steyer served as librettist for these award-winning operas. Steyer has brought music to 24,000 youths in underserved areas with Bellissima's *In the Classroom*. She is President of the vocal alliance Working in Concert, and Artistic Director of its Bellissima Opera initiative. She is on the music faculty at Concordia University in River Forest and teaches music at Ascension Catholic School in Oak Park, IL.

Anna Tonna has been described as a "mezzo heroine who knows how to sing Rossini" by the Rossini Gesellschaft, and as "showing off her warm, secure mezzosoprano to maximum advantage" by the New York Magazine. Her operatic roles have included Rosina, Carmen, and Dorabella, as well as rarer repertoire by Paisiello, Vivaldi, Mascagni, Zandonai and Giordano. She has appeared with the Casals Festival and Festival Iberoamerican de las Artes in Puerto Rico; El Festival de Segovia, Fundación Juan March, Auditorio Nacional de España and the Museo del Romanticismo in Spain; Teatro Grattacielo, Joy in Singing, Elysium Between Two Continents, Música de Cámara, Americas Society and Hispanic Society in New York City; and the Pacific Music Festival in Japan. Her numerous recital appearances include the Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall, the St. Anton Palace in Valletta (Malta), the Palacio Nacional de Ájuda in Lisbon, Teatro 1793 at Villa Adlrovandi Mazzacorati in Bologna, the Athaneums in Madrid and Barcelona and the ElbPhilharmonie in Hamburg. Her commercial recordings include "The songs of Julio Gómez" (Verso), "España alla Rossini" (iTinerant Records) and "The Unknown Pauline Viardot" (Cezanne Productions) and recently "1915: A Trip to Granada" with Klassic Cat Label.

As a collaborative pianist, **Jennifer McCabe** has worked and performed at The Kennedy Center, DePaul University, Northwestern University, Music Institute of Chicago, Wheaton College, The Musical Offering, Opera on Tap, Merit School of Music, NATS, Royal George Theater and ChiArts. Many of her collaborators are Chicago-area university faculty as well as Lyric Opera and Grant Park chorus members. She was previously managing director and board member of Opera on Tap Chicago and faculty representative on the board of The Musical Offering. She has played master classes for Renee Fleming, Ramsey Lewis, Elizabeth Futral, Jane Bunnell, and Michael Ehrman and performed with Nisanne Howell, former violinist with the CSO. An in-demand private piano teacher and music director for

over 25 years, Jennifer was the recipient of "Best of Chicago 2019" for Harmony Piano Studio and received a Sycamore High School Legacy Award in 2020 when she was inducted into their Music Hall of Fame for her lifetime contributions to music. Jennifer has also been an active church musician for over 25 years. She has a B.A. in piano from Northern Illinois University and graduate studies at NIU and MTSU in piano performance and education.

Pianist **Shannon McGinnis** has been recognized for partnerships with some of the brightest stars in the classical vocal music world. Recent highlights include recitals with mezzo-soprano Anna Laurenzo; soprano Nicole Heaston and members of the Elgin Symphony Orchestra (recorded for broadcast on *WFMT*); and appearances with the Collaborative Works Festival, Laguna Beach Music Festival, San Francisco Performances, and the Philadelphia Chamber Music Society. In past seasons she has been heard in concert with members of the Ryan Opera Center and has served official pianist for the Joyce DiDonato masterclasses at Carnegia Hall, broadcast live on medici.tv. A passionate educator, McGinnis serves as Director of Opera Programs at the Chicago College of Performing Arts at Roosevelt University and as Co-Chair of the College's Interdisciplinary Conservatory. She is a co-founder of Collaborative Arts Institute of Chicago and since 2017 has served on the faculty of Prague Summer Nights Opera and Orchestra Festival, which brings together college-aged and pre-professional singers and instrumentalists from across the world for performances in historic venues in the Czech Republic.

Emcee Jeanne Franks is a jazz vocalist and an on-air radio host at WDCB 90.9 FM, Chicagoland's premier jazz station. A board member of Working in Concert, she's inspired by WIC's Black Voices in Cabaret, an initiative that supports Black artists nationwide. A Chicago native, she started piano lessons at age five after hearing her father's jazz trio rehearsing in the living room and asking him for a piano so she could play that music! Jeanne played the flute for her elementary and high school bands and later studied piano and voice privately at Elmhurst College and Benedictine University. For two decades, she was a soprano and soloist in the Wooten Choral Ensemble, singing hymns, spirituals, traditional and contemporary gospel music. She is a graduate of Knox College and earned an MBA from Lake Forest Graduate School of Management. Jeanne fills in the spaces between singing and her radio show as a self-employed marketing, business development and interior design professional in the architecture and construction industry.

Elizabeth Doyle, singer-pianist-composer, has written extensively for musical theater and cabaret, including "Sleepy Hollow" (presented at the Disney ASCAP Workshop in California), "Burnham's Dream" (Theater Wit) and "Duo" (Steppenwolf). She had chamber works performed at the Paradiso in Amsterdam which were heard on Dutch radio. Her cabaret performing career has taken her to France, Germany and throughout the US. This commission marks her further foray into writing art songs and modern classical choral works.

Mary Grace ("M.G.") Bertulfo has had works commissioned by the Pleasant Home Foundation and Bellissima Opera and her short story "Community Builder" was staged and performed at Open Door Theater. She has written for CBS, Pearson Education Asia, Sierra, and Chicago Wilderness. Her poetry, fiction, and essays have appeared in City of Big Shoulders: An Anthology of Chicago Poetry (University of Iowa Press), Amerasia Journal, Growing Up Filipino II, and various anthologies. She is the founder of Banyan: Asian American Writers Collective and has served on the Oak Park Arts District Board.

Cheri Wolf is an artist and maker who can be found actively engaged in creating things on most days of her life. At age 11, she earned her first of many scholarships to the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Although talented in most mediums tried, she has a propensity toward painting, drawing and textiles. Eleven years traveling as a full-time RVer, Cheri has left her marks on the southern states of the country in signs, murals, rain barrels, clothing and digital designs. Back to Chicagoland in August of 2016, she currently resides in Rolling Meadows and works in Special Education to support her son, dog and her incessant need to create. This is her first showing as an adult.

C21 Women's Ensemble is a progressive, auditioned choral ensemble for women, which strives to be fresh and unpredictable, embracing modern compositions and composers while remaining respectful and grateful to the classic choral tradition. Now in its fifth season under the direction of Martha Swisher, its goal is to create musical experiences of deeper meaning with humanistic themes that ring true for audiences. In 2014, it first started as a mixed chorus called the 21st Century Chorale, which evolved through the years to become a small ensemble of women with a mission of women's empowerment. Its programs feature the work and influence of women, whether performing contemporary compositions or carrying forward music from centuries past. C21 Women's Ensemble gains strength from the inspiration in the compositions they sing and brings that strength into the roles they navigate daily as professionals, daughters, mothers, partners and teachers.


CHICAGO CABARET WEEK
